The <u>Veterans Health Administration</u> serves 9 million veterans in 172 medical centers and 1,138 outpatient sites across the United States. The <u>Seattle VA Medical Center</u> opened in 1951 to support the scores of Veterans returning home after World War II. Service members in Washington State have a long history of serving the US in crucial times.

Highlighting resilience and patient-center care for veterans


Data from the <u>National Health and Resilience in Veterans Study</u> indicates that veterans who report strong sense of purpose are more resilient and have better quality of life.

Resilience is the ability to adapt in the aftermath of trauma or extreme stress and maintain a high level of psychological functioning. It is connected to positive re-integration into civilian life, post-military employment, entrepreneurship, and post-traumatic growth (Fogle, et al. 2020). 
