NATIONAL HISPANIC HERITAGE MONTH

Celebrating National Hispanic Heritage Month

September is National Hispanic Heritage Month. This year's theme, **Pioneers of Change** is rooted in the history and traditions of 20 Latin American countries and territories. The Hispanic and Latino populations are the fastest growing minority groups in the U.S., and it is important to embrace their knowledge, expertise and cultural diversity to learn how to best support the next generation of leaders and scholars in decades to come.

Diversifying the medical workforce and increasing the number of marginalized groups in leadership roles is necessary to improve patient centered outcomes. Hispanics only account for 6.1% of the U.S. physician workforce but make up 19% of the U.S. population. One in four children in the U.S. are Hispanic and while they represent 26% of the U.S. pediatric population, only 7.8% of all Anesthesia residents in the U.S. are Hispanic. (Chiem, et al. 2022).

The Latino Center for Health reported that only 3% of physicians in Washington state are Hispanic (Morales, 2020) and data from the <u>Washington State Office of Financial Management</u> show that Hispanics make up 14.5% of the total state population. There is a major shortage of Latino and resident physicians in the U.S. (Martinez, et al. 2022), but increasing pathways to medical school and Anesthesia programs are tangible starting points to address this problem.




