Women's History Month

This year's theme for Women's History Month is Moving forward together! Women educating and inspiring generations.

Over the last decade, the number of women in academic anesthesiology has increased with approximately 36% of academic anesthesiologists being women, but major gender disparities continue to exist in leadership roles. Although women comprise 32.6% of leadership roles in anesthesia societies, this is a significant difference from women in the workplace. Only 8% of women in academic anesthesiology are full professors and only 15% of anesthesiology department chairs are women (Bissing et al. A&A 2019).

Early career mentorship and sponsorship initiatives can bridge the gap (Basile et al., A&A 2023) and create opportunities in the workplace and anesthesia societies (Harbell et al., 2023). This summer, the AAMC is hosting an **Early Career Women Faculty Leadership Development Seminar** to provide women with foundational knowledge and skills that will enable them to thrive as leaders in academic medicine.

Applications are open, and we encourage eligible faculty to attend.




